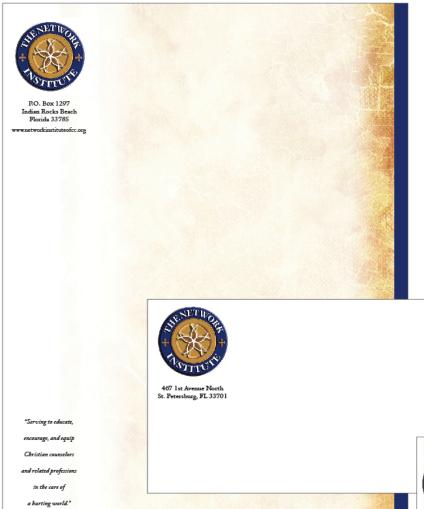
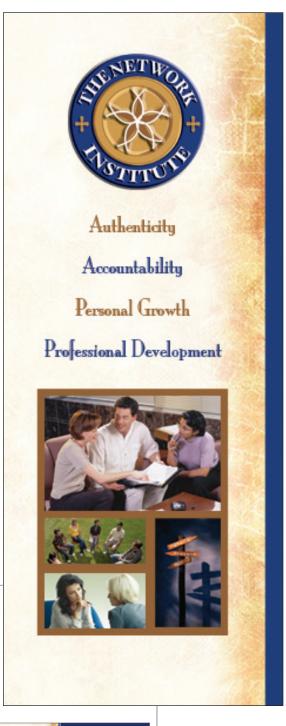
The Network Institute Logo and Branding Case Study

Rose: the faith, the wounds of Christ. The six petals the days of creation

Cross: is the best-known religious symbol of Christianity. It is generally seen as a representation of the crucifixion of Jesus. It is related to the crucifix.

Circle: symbolizes being without end, is a symbol of the divine.

Yellow: is the symbol of light and purity. It speaks of youth, happiness, the harvest, hospitality, love and benevolence.

Blue: signifies the blue skies or the lifegiving air and often signifies hope or good health. It is an alternate color for the season of Advent.

White: Purity, virginity, innocence, and birth, are symbolized with this color. White is the liturgical color of Christmas and Easter

Quatrefoil: ubiquitous in Gothic architecture, the quatrefoil symbolizes the four evangelists, as well as the four gospels.

Dove: symbol of the Holy Spirit and used especially in representations of our Lord's Baptism and the Pentecost. It also symbolizes the release of the soul in death, and is used to recall Noah's dove, a harbinger of hope.

Green: represents bountifulness, hope and the victory of life over death. It is one of the colors associated with Christmas, and the long season of the Trinity in summer.

Blue: signifies the blue skies or the life-giving air and often signifies hope or good health. It is an alternate color for the season of Advent.

White: Purity, virginity, innocence, and birth, are symbolized with this color. White is the liturgical color of Christmas and Easter.

Quatrefoil: ubiquitous in Gothic architecture, the quatrefoil symbolizes the four evangelists, as well as the four gospels.

Fish: ever-watchful with its unblinking eyes — was one of the most important symbols of Christ to the early Christians. In Greek, the phrase, "Jesus Christ, Son of God Savior," is "Iesous Christos Theou Yios Soter." The first letters of each of these Greek words, when put together, spell "ichthys," the Greek word for "fish" (ICQUS). This symbol can be seen in the Sacraments Chapel of the Catacombs of St. Callistus. Because of the story of the miracle of the loaves and fishes, the fish symbolizes, too, the Eucharist

5-point Star: the Star of Bethlehem; the 5 Wounds of Christ.

Sand Dollar: the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus are shown on this shell. On one side, an easter lily contains a five pointed star, the Star of Bethlehem. The five narrow slits in the shell are symbolic of the crucifixion wounds of Christ's hands, feet, and side. The reverse side bears a shape like a poinsettia.

Green: represents bountifulness, hope and the victory of life over death. It is one of the colors associated with Christmas, and the long season of the Trinity in summer.

Brown: is symbolic of the earth and was often the color of a monks robe, signifying humility and God's connection with the commonplace and the ordinary.

White: Purity, virginity, innocence, and birth, are symbolized with this color. White is the liturgical color of Christmas and Easter.



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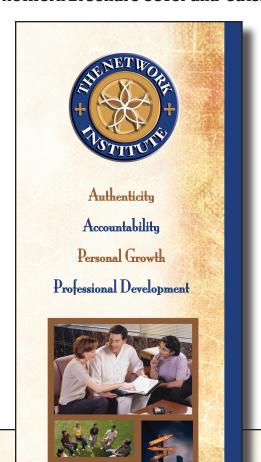

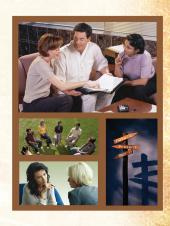

The Good Book and the Big Book: On 12 Step Interventions

Did you know that early A.A. in Akron was a Christian fellowship? Did you know that its basic ideas came from study of the Bible? Did you know that the pioneers claimed to achieve a 75% to 93% success rate—which they properly called "cures"—as the result of their program? Surprising, isn't it?

So much curiosity arises from an
"anonymous society" whose rules forbade promoting it or even explaining the
organization to the press, and whose
members sometimes reported a variety of
vague spiritual beliefs. It is no wonder that
rumors of "door knob" faith and a "higher
power" left some religious leaders queasy!
But to those who examined it more closely, the reality is that this movement and its
Big Book have produced lasting healing
and have radically restored lives for millions around the world in recent history.

Before A.A., alcoholics and addicts simply died in their disease. After AA., sobriety. recovery, and transformed life became a reality for literally millions of alcoholics all over the world. This article is the first in a series designed to help people understand the origin of the Big Book-the 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous, which can empower recovery groups and recovering individuals to benefit from the Christian principles found there. Not so surprising to the Christian is that the powerful healing principles in early A.A. (that were not present in the temperance movement and abstinence crusades) included many facets. Among them, belief in foundational scriptural truth, the commitment

to Christian fellowship, an emphasis on a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, and a charge Continued on pg 2...

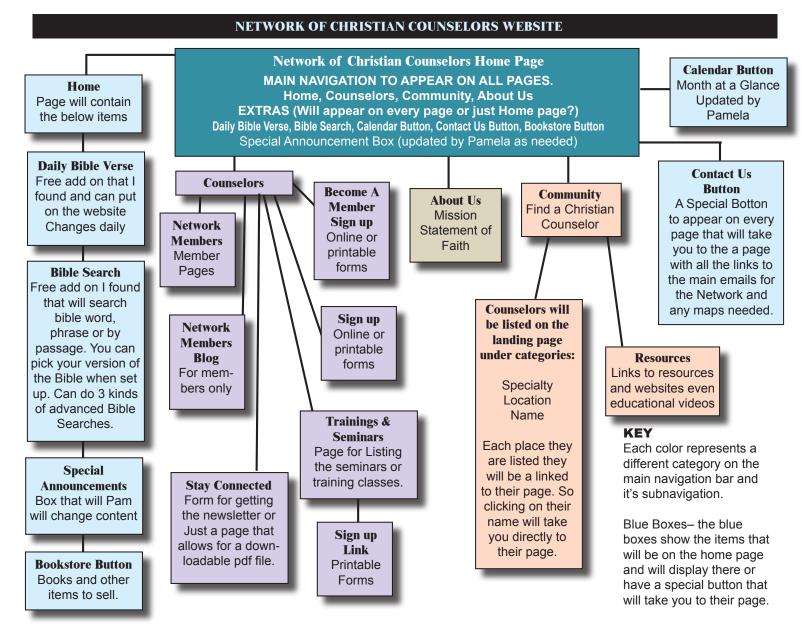
Being offended by what others do to us or around us can be a dangerous path. There are two reasons for this. One is psychological and the other spiritual. From a psychological perspective, when we attempt to manage another's actions or change them in any way, we are in for grave disappointment. We cannot change others, and any attempt to do so can lead to emotional turmoil. True strength comes in changing ourselves and that means our 'reactions' to others. For it is not what others do to

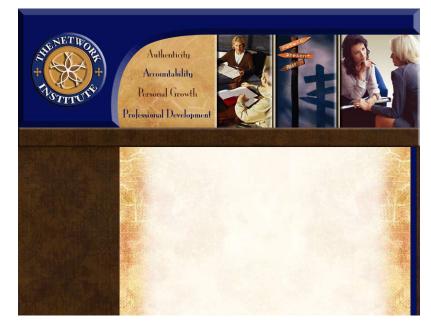
us that counts, but what we think about what they do to us that matters. Offenses lie in our mind not in others'

actions. No one can insult you or hurt you verbally unless you decide to allow it.

From a spiritual perspective, the truth of the matter is that as believers we have no right to take offense at what others do or say to us. When someone tells me of the damaging words or actions of another, I like to encourage them with the life of Christ. He is, after all, our model.
